

CAPTAIN DAVID FLORES

David Flores, a 31 year veteran of the Los Angeles County Sheriff's Department, was promoted to the rank of captain by Sheriff Jim McDonnell and assigned to Temple Sheriff's Station. Temple Station provides law enforcement service to the cities of Bradbury, Duarte, Rosemead, Temple City, and South El Monte, as well as the unincorporated communities of Arcadia, Chantry Flats, Duarte, El Monte, Monrovia, Pasadena, and San Gabriel.

Captain Flores' career with the Sheriff's Department began in 1987. After graduating from the Sheriff's Training Academy as a deputy sheriff, he was assigned to Men's Central Jail. In 1990, he transferred to Temple Station where he worked a variety of assignments, including patrol deputy, special assignment deputy, crime prevention deputy, field training officer and gang suppression deputy. In 1999, he transferred to the Asian Crime Task Force where he promoted to detective and investigated Asian gangs and Organized Crime. He later transferred to San Dimas Sheriff's Station until he promoted to the rank of sergeant in 2006. As a sergeant, he was assigned to Men's Central Jail, Cerritos Sheriff's Station and the Internal Affairs Bureau. He transferred to the Department's Professional Standards and Training Division where he served as the executive aide to the Division Chief. In 2013, he helped with the Department's effort to reorganize the agency, and he was selected to be the executive aide to the Division Chief of the Department's East Patrol Division, which covers the Temple Station area. In 2013, he promoted to the rank of lieutenant and was assigned to the Internal Affairs Bureau where he worked on special projects, became a team lieutenant on the Force/Shooting Response Team, and eventually as the bureau's operations lieutenant. In 2016, he transferred to the Hall of Justice where he was selected to serve as the executive aide to Sheriff Jim McDonnell.

Captain Flores holds an Associate of Science degree in Administration of Justice. He resides with his wife Wendy of eighteen years in Riverside County. He is an Eagle Scout and enjoys travelling, fly fishing, and reading. Their son Mike is a second generation Eagle Scout and is in medical school at Yale University.
